The mission of the Freiburg Revolutionary Study Group is to fill two important positions that so far have been neglected by the left in Freiburg.

Firstly, as an English-speaking group, it opens itself to improved participation from the large amount of international students and expats living in Freiburg, while still including the participation of the very many English-speaking Germans.

Secondly, the study group is characterised by a common interest in antirevisionist and truly revolutionary theory and practice. Revisionism is the removal of class struggle from Marxism. This opportunist right-wing tendency manifests itself in many ways and is the principal cause for the decline of the left and the rise of neoliberal and imperialist "social democracy" in Europe. Despite countless strong activist movements throughout Europe and even the rise to power of relatively radical electoral parties such as Syriza, the destructive neoliberal hegemonic order of Europe has gone unchallenged and it will continue to go unchallenged until class struggle is brought back as the centre point of a revolutionary theory and practice. Thus, anti-revisionism is the means to rediscovering a truly revolutionary theory and practice, and there is so much to rediscover! Buried behind decades of failed social movements characterised by petty activist lifestylism, and so many "socialist" electoral victories, each of which only ever resulted in another knife in the back of the proletariat, there lies an exciting and beautiful history of the people taking power and becoming the masters of their own history. This great history includes the Paris Commune, the Russian Revolution, the Chinese Revolution, the independence struggles of Europe's former colonies, the student movement leading up to May '68, and the Black Power movement, just to name some of the most renown. To the attention of few western leftists, many such revolutionary struggles are still advancing today in the global periphery, in countries such as India and the Philippines. By studying the theory behind such revolutionary successes and the theoretical developments that sprung from their respective revolutionary practices, and in the case of capitalist restoration, what caused their downfall, we unlock the door to a revolutionary science that puts class struggle at the centre of a historical movement towards emancipation from the tyranny of capital. In short, the Freiburg Revolutionary Study Group is for those who are fed up with the left's attachment to losing strategies and want to rediscover the revolutionary theory and practice that on so many occasions pushed the ruling class to the brink and even past it. "If you dare to struggle, you dare to win. If you dare not to struggle then god damn it, you don't deserve to win." If those powerful words from Black Panther Fred Hampton resonate with you, then this study group is definitely right for you.

It is important to add that this group decides democratically, meaning by the vote of the membership, and that the organisational structure of the group is likely to evolve as it grows. Any organisational changes are decided democratically. It should also be clear that as a group committed to the study of the emancipation of the working class, oppressed nations, and marginalised identities, we do not tolerate any racist, misogynist, cissexist, ableist, anti-Semitic, or Zionist views and behaviours. Any such instances must be addressed by the guilty party with a serious, meaningful, and transformative self-criticism. Failure to self-criticise appropriately results in expulsion from the group.



"There was a time when we proclaimed that we were part of a beautiful and fragmented chaos of affinity groups, conflicted organizations, disorganized rebels, all of whom were somehow part of the same social movement that was greater than the sum of its parts. We were more accurately a disorganized mob of enraged plebeians shaking our fists at a disciplined imperial army. Years ago we spoke of social movementism but now it only makes sense to drop the 'social' since this phase of confusion was incapable of understanding the social terrain. Disparate, unfocused, and divided movements lack a unified intentionality; they have proved themselves incapable of pursuing the necessity of communism."

The Communist Necessity is a polemical interrogation of the practice of "social movementism" that has enjoyed a normative status at the centres of capitalism. Despite the fact that the name "communism" has been reclaimed by a variety of important intellectuals, J. Moufawad-Paul argues that, due to a failure to grapple with the concrete questions connected to historical moments of actually making revolution, movementist praxis remains hegemonic. More of a philosophical intervention than a

historiography or political economy, The Communist Necessity engages in a quick and pointed manner with a variety of authors and tendencies including Alain Badiou, Jodi Dean, the Invisible Committee, Tiqqun, Théorie Communiste, and others. Moufawad-Paul argues that a refusal to recognize contemporary revolutionary movements from the 1980s to the present results in the reification of a capitalist "end of history" discourse within this movementist conceptualization of theory and practice.

Originally written as a small essay on the left-wing blog MLM Mayhem, The Communist Necessity has been expanded into a pocket-sized treatise that sketches out the boundaries of the movementist terrain, as well as its contemporary ideologues, so as to raise questions that may be uncomfortable for those who are still devoted to movementist praxis, particularly if they define themselves as marxist. Aware of his past affinity with social movementism, and some apprehension of the problem of communist orthodoxy, the author argues that the recognition of communism's necessity "requires a new return to the revolutionary communist theories and experiences won from history."

95 years ago today, Japanese-American civil rights activist Yuri Kochiyama was born.

During her lifetime Kochiyama advocated for many revolutionary movements including Black Liberation. She was even a close friend and supporter of Malcolm X .

Kochiyama got her start in social justice work after she and her family were sent to an internment camp during World War II. It was there that she began noticing the similarities in injustices between the treatment of Black people under Jim Crow and the interment of Japanese-Americans.

When Kochiyama and her family moved to Harlem in the 1960s, she became very involved in political activism, inviting other civil rights activists like the Freedom Riders, to gatherings at her home. She later met Malcolm X and joined his Organization of Afro-American Unity. When Malcom X was assassinated in 1965, Kochiyama held him in her arms as he died.

In 1977, Kochiyama joined the group of Puerto Ricans who took over the Statue of Liberty in an attempt to draw attention to the Puerto Rican independence struggle.

Kochiyama dedicated her life to several causes including the anti-war movement, nuclear disarmament, political prisoners' rights and reparations to Japanese-Americans interned during World War II. She was even nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize in 2005.

On this day, in 1925, Malcolm X was born in Omaha, Nebraska.

Without a doubt one of the greatest working-class revolutionaries in American history, he fought tirelessly for his own liberation (transforming from Malcolm Little to Malcolm X to el-Hajj Malik el-Shabazz), the liberation of Black Americans, and the liberation of oppressed and disenfranchised peoples everywhere.

The true embodiment of an organic intellectual, self-educated in prison with an internship on the streets, Malcolm traveled the world speaking truth to power. His oratories were sharp and precise, backed by a mountain of knowledge, and delivered with masterful ease. His words represented verbal daggers to racists and oppressors worldwide, and buoys of hope and pride to the disenfranchised and "wretched of the earth."

We recognize their authenticity, we feel their genuineness, and they live within us. We know who they are, and we know who they are not.







Huey P. Newton on environmentalism.

"When we talk about the capitalists' exploitation of nature - the kind of things discussed in what is now called the Ecology movement - we often forget that people themselves are part of the natural world. The mass murder of Blacks in Africa during the slave trade, all the depredations the Europeans committed in South America and the Carribbean, the genocide committed by Nazi Europe against the Jews, Slavs, the gypsies, and, of course, against all people of colour, are probably the greatest example of exploitation of nature by the capitalists. You know the greatest ecological crime being committed right now? The bombing of Vietnam. And we think that until the ecology movement starts recognizing these facts, it will remain largely irrelevant to the majority of people in the world.

People have always struggled against nature, and it is impossible for us who are struggling for the necessities of life, who have set up our own survival programs, to talk about the struggle ending. The difference between us and the capitalists, though, is that we want a rational relationship with nature. We know that the capitalists have put us in a situation where nature cannot support us; and we cannot support nature either. So our struggle is twofold. We struggle to survive and gain power over our environment, and we struggle to have a rational relationship with that environment. Like I've said, we are part of nature ourselves, so we think the difficulties we have with the environment are all in the family, you might say, and can be solved without nostility. The capitalists are not part of that family. They are mad men and will destroy nature as well as us, so our struggle to survive and gain a rational relationship with the natural word is first directed toward getting rid of these mad men."







Women Hold Up Half the Sky

~ Mao Zedong

While Communism has historically fought and led women's liberation movements, this has not been perfect and there are legitimate critiques of a lack of women's role in revolution from the Bolsheviks in Russia 1917 to the Communist Party in China 1949.

Yet, as the Materialist Dialectic prevails, it has the been the Marxist-Leninist-Maoist movements that have put women at the forefront: from Peru, to Nepal, the Philippines and India. Women have been playing major roles, and not only as participants but especially as leaders.

"The Maoist perspective on the women's question in India also identifies patriarchy as an institution that has been the cause of women's oppression throughout class society. But it does not identify it as a separate system with its own laws of motion. The understanding is that patriarchy takes different content and forms in different societies depending on their level of development and the specific history and condition of that particular society; that it has been and is being used by the ruling classes to serve their interests. Hence there is no separate enemy for patriarchy. The same ruling classes, whether imperialists, capitalists, feudals and the State they control, are the enemies of women because they uphold and perpetuate the patriarchal family, gender discrimination and the patriarchal ideology within that society. They get the support of ordinary men undoubtedly who imbibe the patriarchal ideas, which are the ideas of the ruling classes and oppress women. But the position of ordinary men and those of the ruling classes cannot be compared."

This is why the UN Committee on the Elimination of Racial Discrimination has urged Israel to "eradicate" all practices that violate the prohibition of "racial segregation and apartheid."

To dismiss all of this because Israel "is not the same as South Africa" is to miss the point, in the same way that to whitewash systematic discrimination simply because there is an "Arab" on Israel's Supreme Court (the only one from 66 justices past and present) is cheap tokenism."



Hampton suggests the most formidable threat from the BPP (in the eyes of the power structure) was not necessarily its willingness to take up arms in defense, but rather its focus on the "proletarian" class

struggle shared by "poor people of all descents." In response to the constant manipulation of working-class fears (often directed from above), used to divide the masses through the promotion of racism, Hampton made this powerful statement:

"We got to face some facts. That the masses are poor, that the masses belong to what you call the lower class, and when I talk about the masses, I'm talking about the white masses, I'm talking about the black masses, and the brown masses, and the yellow masses, too. We've got to face the fact that some people say you fight fire best with fire, but we say you put fire out best with water. We say you don't fight racism with racism. We're gonna fight racism with solidarity. We say you don't fight capitalism with no black capitalism; you fight capitalism with socialism."




